Course Description

This course will introduce students to a wide range of medieval literary and natural philosophical texts, with Geoffrey Chaucer our primary focus. In addition to recognizing and appreciating medieval (Middle English) forms and genres, literary conventions and strategies, themes, plots, and characters, we will read a number of texts focused on an often-confusing medieval "style of thought." Throughout, we will draw our attention to various aspects of English life in the Middle Ages, including feudal structures and courtly culture, the diversity of religious experiences and the development of a standard English vernacular. This background information will offer students a fuller understanding of Chaucer's legacy as well as help students recognize and appreciate medieval sensibilities, which began to change during and after the renaissance.

The course packet and selections from Geoffrey Chaucer's *The Canterbury Tales* (Oxford) will be available in electronic form on either Moodle or other means for download. Course Requirements
