# EL 402.01 Modern Novel Spring 2024<sup>1</sup>

### **Course Description and Objectives:**

Welcome to EL 402.01 "Modern Novel." The course focuses on the characteristics of the novel from the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> to the late 20<sup>th</sup> century. We will begin with a general discussion on modernism and the modernist fiction, the way(s) in which the modernist novel responds to its sociocultural and political context, and the "newness" it brings to the literary tradition. We will read *Heart of Darkness* by Joseph Conrad, *A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man* by James Joyce, *The Trial* by Franz Kafka, and *Slaughterhouse-Five* by Kurt Vonnegut. These novels explore issues as diverse as horrors of imperialist enterprise, the formation of artistic identity, bureaucratic oppression, and the destruction of war. All four novels engage with the representation of crisis along with the crisis of representation in their unique ways. We will thus investigate the relationship between form and content as we discuss these themes, and try to understand how the authors handle individual consciousness, temporality, spatiality, narration, and memory. We will focus on the literary techniques they employ in their endeavor to expand the conventions of the genre. We will also examine the fluid, if not artificial, boundaries between the modern and the postmodern.

#### **Required Texts:**

Heart of Darkness (1899) by Joseph Conrad A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man (1916) by James Joyce The Trial (1925) by Franz Kafka Slaughterhouse-Five (1969) by Kurt Vonnegut

## **Learning Outcomes:**

This course aims to familiarize the students with modernism and the modernist fiction. By the end of the course, the students will have developed a better understanding of the sociopolitical context(s) of the modern novel and its aesthetic aspects. They will be able to identify and analyze the specific narrative techniques employed by the authors to portray fictional worlds. They will also be able to improve their writing skills and written expression through the exercises provided.
