Course Description

In this class, we will investigate some of the formal tools used in writing short stories, poems and plays; explore how these tools relate to meaning in the work and familiarize ourselves with a range of approaches to analyzing literary works while acquiring the language necessary for literary description.

The course also has a writing component to improve your writing about literature. Starting with pre-writing exercising, we will work on generating successful thesis statements, writing paragraphs with strong topic sentences and well-integrated details from the literary works as well as introduction and conclusion paragraphs for papers. By the end of the semester you will be asked to submit a full literary analysis.

Course requirements

It is essential that you come to class having read the assigned text. In addition to class discussions, there will be in-class activities that involve group writing exercises. You will also submit short writing assignments at the end of our discussions of short stories and poems, and a longer paper of 1000-words by the end of the semester. Participation grade is based on your contribution to in-class discussions, not attendance.
